












Poisonous Plants To Your Pet

Plant	What does it look like?	Symptoms
Lilies		Highly toxic to <u>cats</u> . Severe kidney damage
Marijuana		Depression of the central nervous system, vomiting, diarrhea, drooling, increased heart rate, seizures and coma
Sago Palms		Vomiting, diarrhea, lethargy, depression, black-tarry stool, seizures, liver failure, death
Tulips		Gastrointestinal irritation, drooling, loss of appetite, depression, convulsions, cardiac abnormalities

<p>Azalea</p>		<p>Vomiting, drooling, diarrhea, weakness, depression, cardiovascular collapse, coma and possible death</p>
<p>Oleander</p>		<p>Gastrointestinal irritation, abnormal heart function, hypothermia</p>
<p>Amaryllis</p>		<p>Vomiting, depression, diarrhea, abdominal pain, hypersalivation, anorexia and tremors</p>
<p>Chrysanthemum</p>		<p>Gastrointestinal upset, including drooling, vomiting, diarrhea</p>
<p>English Ivy</p>		<p>Vomiting, abdominal pain, hypersalivation, diarrhea</p>

<p>Peace Lily</p>		<p>Oral irritation (mouth, lips, tongue), excessive drooling, vomiting, difficulty in swallowing, intense burning</p>
<p>Pothos</p>		<p>Mechanical irritation, swelling of the oral tissues and other parts of the G.I tract</p>
